OF ALL THE GENRES local theatre covers (period drama, romance, mystery, fantasy adventure, etc...), the least explored is science-fiction. Picture, if you will, a season that subtly changes this with a number of sci-fi themed shows making their shadowy appearance on somewhat unexpected stages. In October, the UWM

Department of Theatre presents its

production of Einstein's Dreams.

Based on the book by Alan
Lightman, the story follows
the imagination of a young
Albert Einstein as he dreams
of strange worlds tangled in the
fourth dimension. Rebecca Holderness, who directed an acclaimed
production of the play nearly 10 years ago
in New York, is scheduled to direct. UWM

Theatre, which launched Holderness' jaw-droppingly beautiful production of From These Green Heights last April should make this one of the most visually captivating plays of the season.

In November, Off The Wall Theatre will have its chance to deconstruct an inadvertent sci-fi classic with its production of A Clockwork Orange - The Musical. Alex, charismatic leader of a group of young thugs in a dark, future England, engages in all manner of violence until government behavioral conditioning programs him to be pacified. The musical, based on Anthony Burgess' original novel, features lyrics written by Burgess himself. Incidentally, Burgess was a bit nonplussed by the success of the novel and subsequent film adaptation. Feeling the story was overrated, he considered the novel to be one of his lesser works. In any case, fans of the classic Stanley Kubrick film can probably expect homage paid to it. Will the energizing melodies of music by Ludwig Van be pumped through a cheery synthesizer? Time will tell.

As if one sighting weren't eerie enough, a second sci-fi musical opens at the beginning of 2007, courtesy of the Milwaukee Repertory Theatre. *They*

Came From Way Out There begins abducting audiences in the Stackner Cabaret on January 12. The creative team behind the recent Rep Cabaret hit Chaps! invites audiences to help choose the next president of a fictitious group known as "The Paranormal Society" in one of the more off-beat musicals to hit stages next year. While it's guaranteed to make light of the subject of paranormal phenomena, there's no question that it will appeal to anyone who looks expectantly at the night sky. Also, it'll be interesting to see what the Cabaret will come up with for theme drinks and meals this time - anyone for an MJ-12 Burger with Stanton T. Friedman Fries? It looks like the rest of the menu has been redacted by the government...and why are those three pale men in black suits approaching with martinis? Who ordered that?

Also in January, First Stage Children's Theater presents a sophisticated drama based on *The Giver*, the award-winning first book in children's author Lois Lowry's sci-fi trilogy. Set in a utopian world, a 12 year-old boy named Jonas is apprenticed to the title character. Jonas is to be the "Receiver of Memories," and embarks on a journey to confront the world about the humanity it has lost. This is pretty heavy stuff for a children's show, but it's a challenge that one of the nations biggest and best children's theatre groups is more than equipped to handle.—RB
